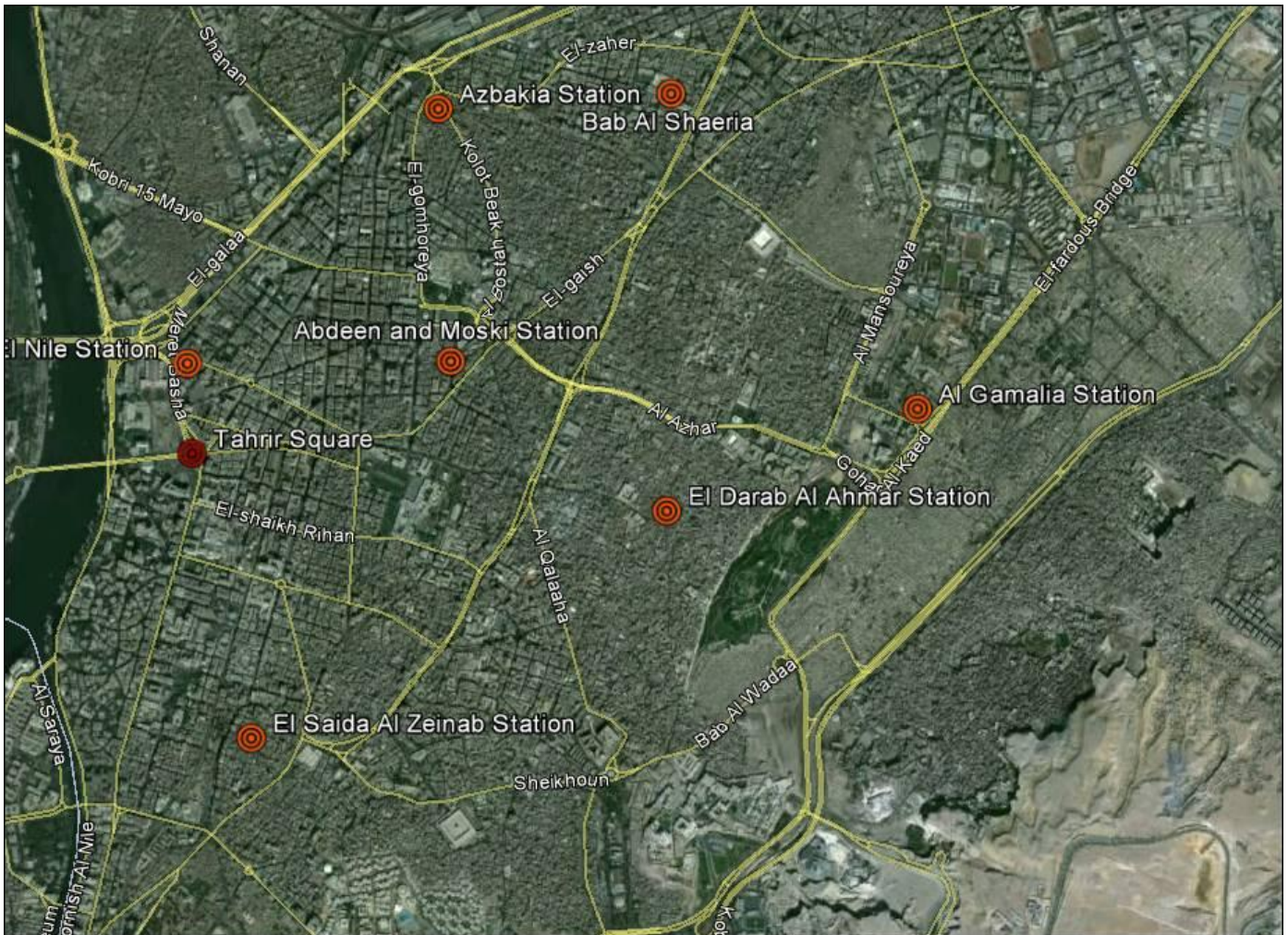


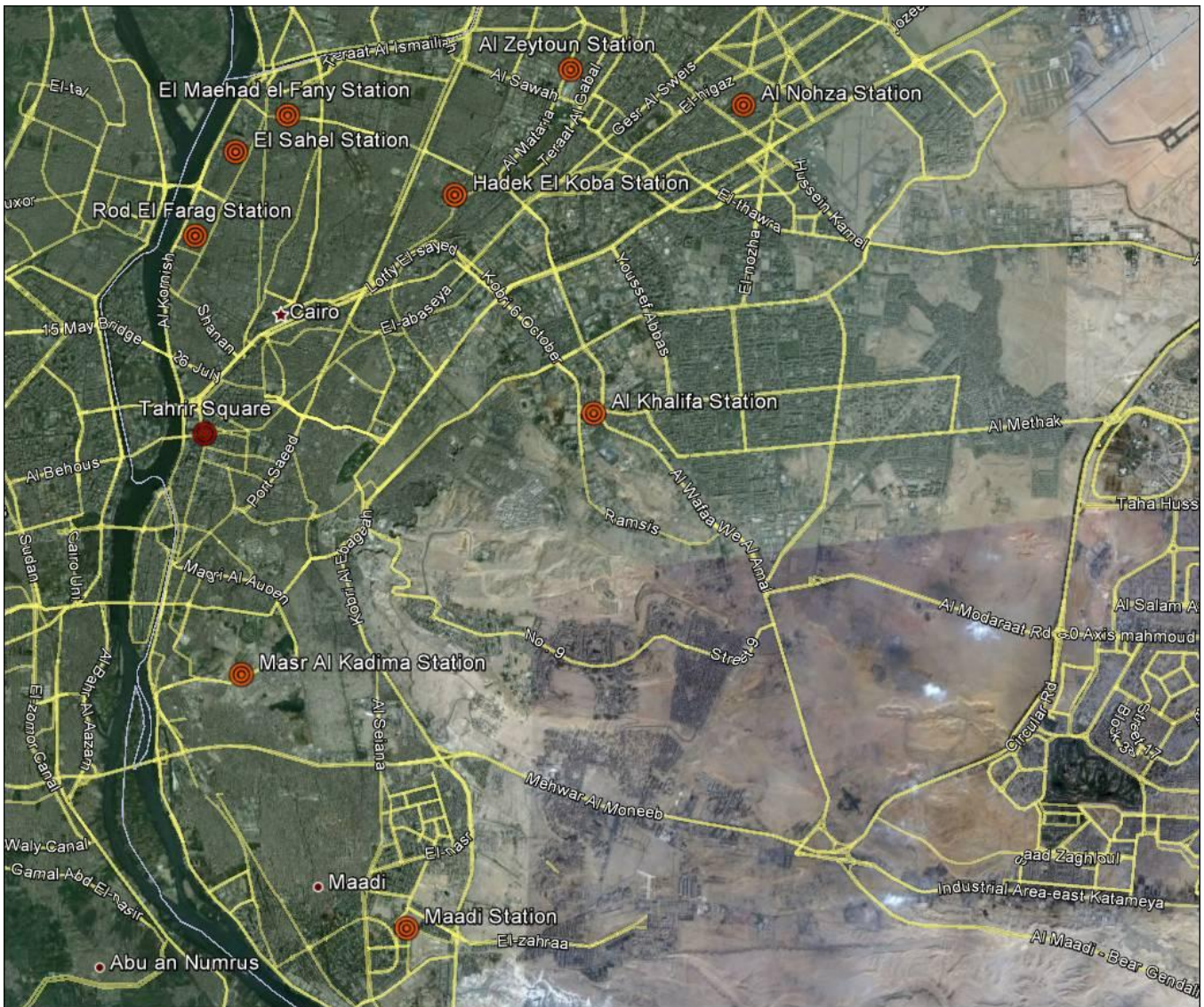
**Please be advised**

(November 28 2011, 7:45 UTC) Polls have opened for the first round of parliamentary elections in several governorates across Egypt, including Cairo. To facilitate the actual voting, local schools have been converted to polling stations. The first round of polling will take place over a 48 hour period until November 29. The Egyptian Interior Ministry has announced that police will beef up their presence around these locations in anticipation of any unrest. Reports from Cairo indicate that several election violations have already occurred, mainly relating to members of certain parties campaigning outside of polling stations. Muslim Brotherhood members are reportedly among those who are campaigning outside polling stations, acts which may spark confrontations with members of opposing parties. Polling in Giza Governorate, including districts of greater Cairo on the west bank of the Nile River will be held in the next round of polling two weeks from today.

***We assess that each polling station is a potential friction point due to the possibility of feuding between members of competing political parties. We recommend avoiding the immediate vicinity of these areas until November 30.***
